### PYP/MYP Report

#### PYP

Jayne Pepler: Third grade report. Looking at lots of different historical figures and modern day explorers, choosing one they connect to, focus on non-fiction text and fictional text, strengthening writing skills and making it fun. In math wrapped up iReady unit 3 with concepts like graphing and area. Trying out new

math curriculum, excited to get away from iReady. Have two more transdisciplinary themes for the year. Encouraging to see how students are engaging and the themes come together.

Lacey: Could you give an update on “Generation Genius” for science?

Jayne: Really fun, it's been a favorite. Starts with a 10-15 minute video, sheets to fill out to help focus on what we're learning about. There's a Kahoot! aspect as well to make things fun, already laid out for us, just guide students through it, very interactive.

Lacey: Don't have a unified set science curriculum, like how aligned this is to next generation science skills. So far feedback has been very positive. Jayme was a mentor, can you explain what that entails?

Jayne: Working with a small group of 5<sup>th</sup> grade students prepping for an exhibition night focused on changing the world. Kidnapping awareness and prevention has been a hot topic with several, students pick real-world topics where they can make a difference.

Carol: Does this raise anxiety in the children?

Jayne: I was surprised, was hearing natural disasters and first aid supplies, but my students watch news and see kids gone missing. Students felt it was important to raise awareness rather than anxiety, students may be looking at phones while walking instead of observing surroundings. Providing with tools and safety routes. Did talk to kids about anxiety aspect.

Lacey: Exhibition is a PYP requirement for 5<sup>th</sup> grade students, and teacher mentors helping students keep on track, Melody coordinating. Will present to community members and parents about their projects in the evening, educate fellow students during the day.

### MYP

Andrew Schmitt: Continuing “transition” theme. Transitioned to in-person learning, made Lake Labish our home. Retrofitted to meet our needs, teachers happy to be doing the job we signed up for. Students may roll eyes about getting ready in the morning but are happier with the social aspects of education. Just finished the “MYP leading the learning” workshop which is a training I was required to take to be MYP coordinator. Not yet an expert on all things, but helped get a sense of timeline as applying for authorization next year, making sure important elements are being put into place. Updating student handbook, thinking about tech and intellectual honesty, AI, and staff training. Focus on inquiry-based learning.

BJ: We had significant behavior challenges the first time we had a middle school. How has behavior management been going this time around?

Andrew: Had a honeymoon phase the first week, students are middle schoolers and have those quirks. Put together Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports. What earns a warning, what earns larger consequence, but also how can we recognize and reward students? Restorative Justice conversations going well with our principals. Not just handing out consequences, but principals talk to the student and bring parties together when ready to mend a relationship. Often strengthens relationships. That has been really positive.

Steve: Appreciate the work you're doing and the flexibility students, staff and parents have shown.

Andrew: Had multiple families help us move into Lake Labish, wonderful to be part of a supportive community. Teachers making the most of the challenges of the year, and families deserve a big shout out for being so supportive.

**Principal/Assist. Principal Report**

Lacey: Inquiry clubs rescheduled to this Tuesday. Teachers have wishlist that have been posted in ParentSquare if people would like to donate.

Carol: Board members do not have access to that.

Lacey: Will forward that info to you. Have 80 applications submitted to lottery, applications will close tomorrow at 5pm. Had open house Feb 25.

Katherine: March STEAM challenge is at-home leprechaun trap challenge. Have access to Generation Genius through 8<sup>th</sup> grade, so being used in both PYP and MYP.

Lacey: By purchasing K-8 version, opens options for teachers. PYP teachers are previewing Bridges in Math. This is a K-5 math curriculum that focuses on hands-on learning while building strong math conceptual knowledge. Currently using iReady, not a big fan of it. We will have a meeting with a rep from Bridges to learn more about the curriculum and ask some questions to see if this could be a good fit for us next year. Based locally, is renowned after many years of testing. Very well respected.

Carol: How soon will you need to decide?

Lacey: Want to know what we're going to use before inservice.

Cammi: Why did many districts move away from Bridges?

Lacey: Doesn't have the most student-friendly interface on the digital side. Districts are looking for something easy to use on a Chromebook or iPad. Bridges is more paper and pencil with some interactive games, no digital component. As far as alignment to standards have not heard concerns. High teacher prep involved, experienced that when I taught 3-4 grades, had two days of prep time.

Cammi: Many teachers with little prep time found it was a lot to get going.

Katherine: My district last year was using some newer digital elements last year so whole class can play some of the games.

Lacey: Not nearly as robust as iReady on digital side. Like some reduction of screen time.

Carol: Like the idea of pen and paper.

Cammi: Do we have cost numbers?

Lacey: Not yet.

Katherine: Adopted in 2018 at old district, scores went up substantially the first year. Research-based.

Lacey: Our math scores are lower than our reading scores, so there is room for improvement. Bridges is helpful in identifying gaps. For every work place, there is an if/then card to help adapt the challenge to the level of the student. Hardest part of teaching is the wide spectrum of needs.

Cammi: Liked it because when I would push-in with SPED kids, could do work other kids were doing at a modified level, instead of doing things off to the side because they couldn't engage with the regular curriculum.

Katherine: Created a flyer to use when having discussions about behavior that walks through IB approach to behavior at Valley. Focus on a problem being something that disrupts learning or makes school feel unsafe. Most behaviors start small. After we talk to student and gather info, we evaluate whether restorative conversation is appropriate and if students are ready, taking steps to take steps towards restoration. It is risky to take part in a conversation and listen respectfully and work toward a solution, and that's the kind of responsible risk-taking we want to develop. We believe everyone can grow and learn from mistakes, and we can share this flyer with parents if we need to.

Lacey: This has been helpful in MYP. PYP behaviors are different. There are fresh starts given and we handle things differently than some other schools. MYP students are great. Ready for both programs to be at the same location.

#### Staffing Updates

#### HVAC Updates

- Cafeteria and 1<sup>st</sup> grade; all were serviced in fall, these two are reaching end of life. Got multiple quotes, came back as over \$5k for units only not counting labor. Looking at going with a different company, offer a 10% discount for local schools.
- CJ Hansen did our initial work. Got additional quotes from Advantage Heating and Aeros Home Air. That last one added two years of upkeep and maintenance to their bid, so likely to be the one we go with.

Lacey: Spring Break is natural transition time, looking to get spots filled. Looking at how we can structure MYP for next year, likely more info at next board meeting. Wanting to make shifts on how we offer certain classes, may need to restructure some positions. Will not be doing MYP lottery because we have students enrolled. Students who applied and are on waitlist will go forward from 5<sup>th</sup> grade. For current 5<sup>th</sup> grade families will have information coming out. Will have something similar to KG open house, and already have students on waitlist so we won't have a lottery.

Cammi: If someone wanted to apply for next year's 8<sup>th</sup> grade, could they apply now?

Lacey: Yes, would work like waitlist in elementary. Did send out postcard to K-5 families, saw big spike in waitlist. Will do a similar push for middle school families.

## Construction Updates

Cammi: Construction moving right along. Anticipated final walkthrough is near end of April. First walkthrough is first week of April, could potentially start moving in furniture at that point. Need final signoff to get students in buildings, hopefully no further delays. Quite a bit of work to complete. Ramps, interior, electrical, plumbing is almost finished (likely by end of this week) except for portable #2 that needs a complete new bathroom.

The loudest, most disruptive work will be done during the next three days when we're off school and during Spring Break with grading of sidewalks and ramps, loud and some shaking, so appreciate Andy Metcalf working with us to schedule that off of normal school days. Sent board concrete change order that came through today. Not sure why it was overlooked, but a patch of old concrete that was going to be spliced with new concrete could be replaced with new to make it not have a weird slice. Came in as just under \$5k.

Flooring is next big change order, brought it up at last week's meeting. Question on whether to do patchwork on portable floors or entirely new floors. To replace ceiling tiles and bathroom flooring is \$60,792. If we do everything the same, comes in around \$110k. Need to discuss this. The flooring subcontractor said numbers might come in slightly lower with full, but still working out some details.

Other two change orders are for HVAC and roofing. Found grilles they thought were missing, will reduce the cost from around \$13k will be lower, but still working out numbers. Spoke with Blake a little more in-depth about roof. Not just things to get it up and running, but near future. We can ask for things between now and completion from Andy Metcalf, but they will add days and cost for supervision. Blake recommended doing some of this later, perhaps in summer, so we can get in. Might be able to do it not prevailing wage which would reduce cost 30%. Won't be paying contractor to manage the project, we would manage on our own. We can ask for full replacement on two that need new roofs now, but may be costlier and delay moving in. To cross it off the list, they have to cap the portables for around \$3500 per portable. Requested more quotes, as Dakota gave a quote which seemed high. Might come down to \$3k per portable. Currently portables have open seams at the top, need to be capped and weatherized. If we need to re-roof those portables, we would eat the cost of capping because it would have to be done a second time.

Would prefer to be given a go-ahead for Lacey and I with conditions for HVAC and concrete, but if you want to get together for another meeting we can. Expecting \$8k or so per mini-split. There are other nice-to-haves we should discuss for the courtyard like benches, making a covered area, landscaping, etc. Have a meeting with landscapers for what we need to do since we don't have irrigation and with current field.

Steve: Did Metcalf give a project financial summary for original, current, and what they think remaining charges will be? It was something like \$1.5M.

Lacey: Was \$1.49, we're at \$1.79M with more to go.

Steve: We have fencing, covered area, tech, signage, benches, well system, basketball hoop... Our original was \$4.7M and change, purchase was around \$1.8M. We still have some left but it is dwindling. Like the idea of holding off on certain things to save costs. Lets us see what our final cost with Metcalf is, and see what's above/below spending threshold. I'll work with you and Lacey so I can bring back to the board exactly where we stand and what pending items might cost so we can have a sense of what's left.

Cammi: Appears we have around \$1M left.

Steve: Showing just shy of that, but wishlist is anywhere between a quarter to three quarters of a million, and more may come down the line.

Cammi: Could turn down the concrete option and save \$5k. Not a lot, but it adds up.

Steve: Are there any ADA accommodations required in the concrete?

Cammi: Didn't look like it. Not sure what was there before but some footings that increase demo cost.

Steve: Interested in doing floors.

Cammi: Maybe should do treasurer report before we take items to vote.

### **Treasurer Update**

Steve: Starting last month, doing more in-depth financial reports. Can feel free to ask now or ping after meeting for what each piece is. This is like a dashboard for board members for what is going well and what needs attention. Cash on hand is 252, well over 60 required. Annual disclosures were done. Even though compliance cert is showing yellow, even though it was filed a few days ago, is that we were a few days late on that filing. On fairly new bond processes that is pretty normal, but if it becomes a pattern that will be of greater concern. As we're developing out this process, we don't want to regularly see that.

Still need to set up repair and replacement fund, will need to meet with Lacey in next few days. Payment Disclosure went to EMMA. On 2/14 had failure to file Q2 report, then was filed 3/4/2026. \$1.32M cash in bank, \$156,413 monthly SSF revenue (Feb 2026), \$0 in outstanding payables. Recent expenditures included facilities and building costs and curriculum and programs, along with the expected construction costs. Sodexo is our breakfast and lunch vendor.

Lacey: We had a few weeks with MYP where we were paying for our meals, back to getting it reimbursed now. Wasn't for outdoor school.

Steve: That is an artifact from copying slide, missed replacement. A new auditor is stepping into role of one who is retiring. They were fairly blunt that our audits have been rocky in the lead-up to get our books ready for auditing. They've somewhat worked as bookkeepers to get it auditable, had one department that gets it ready and one that audits. They don't like doing both in-house, and it causes extra expense. Now a more complex scenario, growing from small school to nearly \$6M in bond obligations, might be time to consider strengthening financial operations.

As treasurer, feel we need to look at bookkeeping process, and recognizing that scope is beyond what a part-time person can do. Doing more in-house, do not have CPA on staff, despite staff stepping up in a big way. Want to talk to CPA for consulting, possibly look at external bookkeeper. Even with help of advisor we had a late filing. As treasurer, several payments were fairly past-due, puts vendors in a hard place. Feel we need to evolve our bookkeeping process, engaging with a CPA to get a consultation about whether we have the right processes so audit isn't a mad rush in July, and whether this is something we can do in-house or need to contract out for. If they say we can do it in-house, great, but if they recommend having a 3<sup>rd</sup> party bookkeeper, then we may need to look into that.

"Building Hope" was recommended for charter schools by our auditor. Howard Street using a retired CPA. Strong benefit to engaging an external bookkeeper is that you're not relying on a single individual. If you engage an agency, they have multiple staff which can step in. We would be in a hard place without a consultant helping.

Carol: When you say full time bookkeeper, do you mean 40 hours a week?

Steve: I don't mean a full-time employee of the school, but someone who does this kind of work full-time. Our current consultant did this for the school in the past and has the skills, but doesn't do this by trade.

Carol: Has to be firm, not just individual?

Steve: Asked that question of auditors. Some cost savings through individual, but hard to find the right person. Public bond, charter school, pass-through funding, isn't typical business stuff. Also has sole-source risk if that person retires or we need something urgently.

Lacey: LRB is great and help us put together report, but a lot is required of us, which is me pulling those things and I'm not a financial whiz. Some of these things are outside of my scope as a principal. Even asking an office manager step into these roles is a lot more complicated. It isn't just general bills, it's reimbursement for capitol projects, etc.

Steve: We have accounts receivable through Cheetah Care, and some areas of AR are over 90 days past due. With a bookkeeper would have someone sending

out payment reminders to keep those from escalating to 90 days past due, would write off or send to collections things that old in a former role at credit union. Invoice timing is something where we want to make sure we're paying vendors on time. Bookkeeper would be responsible for all of that. Within Quickbooks we have negative tax liabilities on the balances with either overpayments or mispostings which haven't been reconciled. Another is the replacement fund where the bookkeeper could make sure we're moving forward. We've been asking more and more of our bookkeeper, and it's asking a lot.

Seems that step one is engaging a CPA as a consultant to find the right pathway forward.

Cammi: Mentioned last year this was one of the services we were looking into along with Payroll. We want to make sure we stay on top of these things. As our school grows we will need to address this need.

Cammi: Want to hear from you, I know it has been heavy so far.

Lacey: Question in chat about specific expenses when discussing transition from virtual to Lake Labish. Didn't have a lot of additional costs, are getting Lake Labish for no cost beyond utilities.

Cammi: I didn't get any emails.

**8:08pm Board Meeting Norms**

Cammi: Garrick helped me work on one version of board norms, another member helped with a different version.

Garrick: It was very rules-focused, tried to keep that structure in the sections. All in all, I appreciate Steve's overall approach to the layout, less a list of rules and more a spirit of the interactions approach. Doesn't get as much into "if this then that" scenarios, which might get us into some questionable territory.

Carol: Only seeing Garrick's version

Garrick: There were five attachments on the email, might be hidden in there, called "Our Shared Agreements for Board Meetings."

Steve: Not necessarily one or the other, somewhat complementary.

Lacey: Perhaps have policy that is public-facing and then more core details.

Garrick: Not as concise and not exact match to Roberts Rules, but based on it. Doesn't elaborate all of the elements of how a motion is made, etc. Called out community engagement, for instance.

BJ: I like the policy and procedure approach, where Steve's version is more of the policy and intent, while Garrick and Cammi's version is more the procedure that lays out rules and addresses specific ways of dealing with situations. Probably some wordsmithing needs to take place.

Carol: I like that approach.

Garrick: Can be complimentary to each other, could wordsmith it some more or take another stab at it.

Cammi: Like the idea of having this public so expectations are clear.

BJ: I would do more of the edits on Steve's to make it less technical and lean heavy on the intentions, and more heavily hit the rules and specifics in the other document.

Carol: Can we decide on what we're going to do? Are you going back to the drawing board and then will vote later, or do we need to vote on changes?

Garrick: Might be more complicated to do two versions.

Steve: Once we adopt it, it becomes a policy and would require vote to change, so it's easier to make it right the first time.

Carol: Just trying to understand process.

Garrick: I like to keep it simple, if one vote will do it, I like that. Anything missing?

BJ: Stuff about holding community members accountable, or community holding board accountable, but not much about how we hold each other accountable.

Garrick: Agree, should be something to clarify those actions.

Cammi: Could also refer that to grievance policy which we need to refine as well.

Lacey: Is there not already something about how to remove board members?

Cammi: There is, we can point to bylaws.

BJ: Don't need to get into the weeds, just that we should hold one another accountable.

Steve: These are made with good intent, but often they're put away and then twelve months later, this can become a hammer and it doesn't land well with the community. Better to include at beginning of each meeting to keep it top of mind and keep it from coming to that.

Carol: Starting to see expectations at little league games for behavior of fans.

Garrick: I have to leave. (Garrick departs at 8:30pm)

**Items to vote on**

Cammi: Need to vote on flooring first.

Carol: When we discussed flooring issue, though I heard patchwork, and I don't think I like that. Not fixing the problem with patchwork, just putting on a bandaid. Would rather fix it now.

Cammi: Specialist said it was a viable option. Question is more about tiles popping up with surrounding flooring, but a maintenance person could glue them down. The look will be of patchwork. They will try to match, but the aesthetic won't be as nice, won't be a direct match. Where we definitely need to repair is #2 which had the carpet with damaged subfloor. That subfloor will need replaced. That one will get all new flooring either way.

Steve: From my perspective, it is not an insubstantial cost, but we got these buildings for virtually free, we knew there would be issues. Don't want ongoing maintenance issues, they will deteriorate eventually and we won't have bond funds at that point. Want to give something new and nice students and staff can enjoy. More important to me by sheer hours spent on that surface than landscaping. Heard possible additional expense for wax and sealing?

Cammi: That's included in the approximately \$110k quote. Not waxing and sealing if doing partial replacement.

Steve: Did they give an indication of useful life on floors?

Cammi: Around 15 years. Might make walls and doors look dingy by comparison.

Lacey: We can do minor painting, they're making Lake Labish home for now and it's in far worse condition.

Cammi: Our office space will need smaller walls for a sick room and such. Working with Blake, Lacey and Ms. Purkey on that. If we added it on current project would likely be June before we get in.

Steve: Does flooring extend timeline?

Cammi: No, floor can be done on one while work is being done on another.

Steve moves to authorize Cammi to go forward with full replacement of floors. Ed seconds. Vote: 4 yes / 1 no / 0 abstain. Motion passes.

Cammi: Next item is HVAC. Weren't able to get final change order to us as they just found things this morning, but expecting under \$13k.

Steve: What all is entailed?

Cammi: Not including mini-splits, just the ducting. Then the roofing would like to proceed with capping, then revisit full replacement on portables 3 and 5.

Steve: What is Andy Metcalf's oversight fee? Is it around 20%? And what is full roof price?

Cammi: Yes around 20%, not sure on full price.

Steve: If I project \$20k per building, would cost more to have oversight.

Cammi: Black called about metal roof, around \$25k.

Steve: Stings to pay now for something we'll rip off, but cheaper in long run.

BJ: I'm guessing not, but can we use a tarp or a tent and awning company?

Cammi: Likely Andy Metcalf wouldn't sign off on that.

BJ: Figured not, but worth asking. I agree with Steve, better in the long run to eat the cost of the roof cap now and replace for less money later.

BJ motions to authorize Cammi and Lacey to approve roof caps for portables. Steve seconds motion. Vote: 5 yes / 0 no / 0 abstain. Motion passes.

Cammi: For concrete, what do we want to do?

Ed: Looks unsafe from picture.

Cammi: No safety concerns expressed, more concern with inability to match, might have buckling issues we're seeing out front.

Steve: Concerned about sound and disruption right next to building.

Cammi: Will be done during spring break.

Lacey: Will yellow pole be removed?

Cammi: Yes.

Steve: Move that we allow Cammi and Lacey to move forward on removing the pole and replacing the concrete. Ed seconds. Vote: 5 yes / 0 no / 0 abstain. Motion passes.

Lacey: The SKSD one that we have would be pretty easy to adapt. If you make the payment to OSBA, they have that and other resources, but you'd have to decide if you want to.

Cammi: We could discuss that route if it looks like we need to go that way, but one from SKSD isn't bad, could be easily tweaked. Matthew Lowe would be happy to take a look at it to make sure it fits the needs of our charter. If we don't start this work soon, it won't happen before end of school year.

Steve: Committee of two means we don't have to worry about public meetings notices. If more want to join, we could come back to board with recommendations.

Lacey: Can someone else who is not a board member join since it's a committee?

Steve: Yes, that would be fine.

Carol: I wouldn't mind.

Cammi: We'll need to brainstorm how to replace board positions. It's almost 9pm now.

Steve: Thank you staff for sticking around so long!
